Formed in September, 1974, The Feminist Radio Network produces and distributes audio tape programs by, for and about women. We joined together to create a responsive alternative for women in radio. As radio producers, women are often isolated and ill-paid if at all, with little control over the distribution of their work. As listeners, we rarely hear programming which strengthens our faith in our ability to define our own lives.

FRN therefore works closely with our affiliates throughout the country in an ongoing process of analysis, and all FRN producers receive royalties on the sale of their tapes. Our programming goals include expanding the concept of feminist issues to include any and all of the forces which affect our lives.

We seek to produce and solicit programs which have the widest relevance to a broad spectrum of listeners. Much of our programming incorporates music, drama, and interviews in fast-paced, non-linear, collage formats in addition to speeches and discussions.



OFFICE WORKERS

+WAITRESSES

Waitressing is a profession that often touches our daily lives. In this overwhelmingly female-dominated aspect of the food service industry, unions are rare and the special wage form, tipping, creates a unique economic relationship between management and workers, waitress and customers. The voices in this show are from waitresses-young and old, black and white. They work in exclusive restaurants, hamburger joints and officers' clubs. Within a collagedocumentary format, these women speak of their job conditions, their customers, and their work attitudes. They are counterposed with customers and restaurant managers telling what they "like in a waitress." Includes music. 59 minutes

IT'S SO NICE TO HAVE A WOMAN AROUND THE HOUSE

An interview with Florence Adams, author of I Took a Hammer in My Hand: The Woman's build It and Fix It Handbook. Ms. Adams' approach is that fixing things is simple. These readings describe the circumstances which put women behind bars, the conditions there, the strength and unity that keeps many women prisoners fighting for change and the role of people on the outside in this struggle.

+AIN T IT A SHAME: BATTERED WOMEN

Beaten by their husbands or boyfriends, caught in a trap of economic dependence, isolation, official indifference and fear, women sing of the blackand-blues they have suffered as victims of woman-abuse. These victims, with feminist activists and attorneys, discuss how woman-abuse is rooted in the sexism and violence of our culture. They talk of the "new day" when women will not be powerless in these situations as real alternatives like shelter houses and support groups begin to emerge. Includes music.

+LESBIAN MOTHER/LESBIAN DAUGHTER

Chana Wilson and her mother Gloria are both lesbians. In a warm and illuminating dialogue, Chana talks with Gloria about her 20 years of marriage, mental hospitals and the pain of being a lesbian, alone and isolated. They go on to describe their relationship today and the support they give each other.

"What you have to do is go into court, educate that judge, overcome years and years of prejudice." Founding members of the Washington Area Feminist Federal Credit Union talk about how feminist credit unions are providing an alternative to this financial catch-22. Excellent program for those interested in organizing a feminist credit union in their community.

ITALY, IRAN AND IRELAND

"Only 19% of Italian women work ... of that 19%, 5% work in home related industries that they don't get any pay for." "In Iran in the 1890's there were women who were never allowed to go out of their houses, never allowed to congregate anyplace, to talk to anyone." "In the constitution of Ireland it says that women have only one role to play ... and that is to be wife and mother." These and other issues are discussed in informative reports on the political situation of women in Italy, Iran and Ireland.

Worlds from Within— Making Music

+IAZZ WOMEN: A SERIES

Jazz historians and critics notoriously under-represent women's contributions to the music. Through commentary and music, the intention of this 8-part series on Jazz Women is to peek into the crevices of the past and present to discover these neglected talents.

STRINGED INSTRUMENTS—This segment of Jazz Women deals with women who play instruments with strings—Mary Osborne on electric guitar, Alice Coltrane on harp, Dorothy Ashby on koto and harp, Lee Morgan and Carol Kaye on bass.

HORNS—Traditionally we find women involved in jazz playing piano or singing. In this edition of Jazz Women we explore the music of women who express themselves on horns—Vi Redd on alto sax, Melba Liston on trombone and Barbara Donald on trumpet.

30 minutes

COMPOSERS—Jazz Women looks at three of the best-known contemporary women composers of jazz—Carla Bley, Annette Peacock and Toshiko Akiyoshi. Toshiko Akiyoshi came to the Newport Jazz Festival from Japan in the fifties as a pianist and has since moved to composing and arranging for the Toshiko Akiyoshi-Lew Tabakin Big Band. Bley and Peacock have had many of their original and eclectic compositions recorded by other contemporary musicians. Their own albums exhibit their extensive creativity in the field of New Music

60 minutes

KEYBOARDS, PART I—Since the earliest recordings female keyboardists have been playing their part. Jazz Women features Lovie Austin, composer and leader of a mid-20's band called the Blues Serenaders, and Mary Lou Williams. Williams was born in 1910, and by the time she was 11 Earl Fatha Hines was calling for her after school to jam, while Count Basie and Duke Ellington slid off their piano benches to listen to her.

KEYBOARDS, PART II—The fifties keyboardists featured in this show include Marian McPartland and Patti Bown on piano. On organ Trudy Pitts, Shirley Scott and Gloria Coleman are featured. Coleman began her career as a bassist and played in 1958 with the all-woman quintet, the Jazz Maidens, led by Melba Liston.

45 minutes

KEYBOARDS, PART III—The current offerings of jazz pianists are a world apart from the bop and swing of the decade past. Patrice Rushen released her first album at the age of 20 and also composes, arranges and orchestrates. Jessica Williams and Joanne Bracken are two other current virtuosas. Both have incredibly powerful styles. Connic Crothers plays free. She says, "there is no prearranged harmonic progression, no fixed underlying structure; there are no restrictions of any kind."

VOCALESE: SCATTING—Scatting, a wordless vocalizing imitative of instrumental soloning, was developed by the creative genius of Ella Fitzgerald in the thirties. Other women featured with their own improvisatory styles are Annie Ross, Ernestine Anderson, Dakota Station and Betty Carter.

VOCALESE: CONTEMPORARY-

Newer jazz singers have a different, more free-flowing style of vocalese. The most successful of the contemporary stylists is Brazilian Flora Purim. Extremely inventive Polish vocal percussionist Urszula Dudziak is also featured in her early solo recording of improvisations, Newborn Light.

+MUSING WITH KAY GARDNER

An inspiring conversation with flutist Kay Gardner about music and psychic healing, rituals that unite ancient pagan traditions with the celebration of womanspirit today, and visions of the future for womankind. Includes music from Kay's album, Mooncircles.

*+MARGIE ADAM

"Pick a flower from my soul/Put it in a crystal bowl/Water it with tender care/And watch it open in the air . . ." These lyrics from Margie Adam's song "Images" open a tape inviting the listener into the world of this popular feminist musician and songwriter. In an interview with music, Margie discusses her music, the growth of women's culture and her recent album, Margie Adam, Songwriter. 28 minutes

*+IZQUIERDA

"You can't kill the spirit/It's like a mountain/Old and strong/It lives on and on." A musical interview with Naomi Littlebear and Kate Campeau of the Izquierda Ensemble. Naomi speaks of her personal struggles growing up Chicana and poor, with aspirations of being a musician. She speaks of ways in which the women's music movement can grow to encourage and support Third World women musicians. Included are several of Naomi's moving songs which speak of our common struggles and our undying spirits.

ELLEN McILWAINE

"She doesn't play the guitar, she sings the guitar!" A musical interview with Ellen McIlwaine, a noted musician and songwriter whose distinctive and versatile guitar and vocal style have placed her in a category of her own. 28 minutes, 50 seconds

*+WOMEN AND COUNTRY MUSIC, PARTS I & II

A musical journey from the present back to the roots of country music. Brief introductory comments trace the important role women have played in the growth of the country sound. Part I covers its traditional heritage-from the music of the Scottish-Irish settlers in the Appalachians to the close harmonies and distinctive instrumental style of the original Carter Family. In Part II the poignant songs of love and day to day realities by Brenda Lee, Dolly Parton, Loretta Lynn, Patsy Klein, Kitty Wells, Lynn Anderson and Tanya Tucker are featured in this musical history of female country singers recorded in Nashville from 1950 to the present.




WOMEN AND TRADITIONAL MUSIC

Several poems are read aloud as a part of the dialogue and as illustrations of feminist poetry.


